

## COLUMBIA CITY GEM OF THE SOUTHEAST

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n May 3, 1907, the Seattle City Council annexed Columbia City. The Town of Columbia was incorporated in 1892, and a five-member Town Council was established. Columbia also had a Board of Health and its own volunteer fire department.

The small town of Columbia struggled with the issues of growth and building an infrastructure to support the town's population.

Complaints about and petitions for a water system, improved streets, and a sewer system were common.

Columbia achieved "city" status in 1905 when its population reached the required total of 1,500 under state law. The mayor, W. W. Phalen, called a special election and the public voted in favor of incorporation (unincorporated towns are governed by counties and lack independent legal and fiscal authority).

There was talk that year of annexing to Seattle, but residents wanted more local control over saloons. The town prided itself on having never had a saloon within its corporate limits. But opinions shifted after the tax base proved too small to maintain essential services. The vote on March 5, 1907, was 109 to 3 in favor of annexation.

Nearby Southeast Seattle was annexed earlier in the year. The town incorporated for the sole purpose of annexing to Seattle, as Ravenna had done on October 11, 1906. Southeast Seattle comprised the neighborhoods of Seward Park, Hillman City, Mt. Baker, Beacon

Hill, and a portion of Rainier Valley. When it was annexed on January 7, 1907, Seattle Mayor William Hickman Moore


